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Charisma Design Studio: A New Chapter

An Interview with Cathy Prieto-Smith

Earlier this year, Charisma Design Studio, a longtime Houston jewelry community mainstay, reopened its doors in a new location following the double whammy of Hurricane Harvey and COVID-19. HMAG recently chatted with owner Cathy Prieto-Smith about the past, present, and future of Charisma Design Studio.

HMAG: Tell us a little about your artistic and commercial background.

CPS: My art background has been a part of my life as long as I've been alive. I've always been an adorned nerd! But my true passion was showing others how to be one too. As time passed, I began getting requests for my work, so I started creating objects of wire and beads on my kitchen table. I spent many happy years focusing on my family, but in the back of my mind there was always a dream. I made a promise to myself that I would go back college when my youngest turned 18. I did. In 2012, in my senior year before graduating from University of Houston with a BS in Psychology, I needed one easy last elective. I found Val Link and Metalsmithing 101. That was it--I found my calling! **HMAG:** Take us back to the beginnings of Charisma Design Studio. What motivated you to open a studio? Did you see a gap in the Houston market?

CPS: Charisma Design began at my dining room table, where I created things for myself and for friends. As I got into working with silver, I bought a small torch for my garage. I quickly outgrew that, plus my husband got sick of my supplies taking up the dining room table!

I then turned my garage apartment into a studio and began teaching small classes. As my popularity increased, I quickly outgrew that space as well.

At the time, the Houston arts scene was growing, which was very inspirational. I wanted to be a part of it. I watched as Silver Street Studios began to take the community by storm. I wanted a community of artists sharing one roof. I began looking for a larger space. My amazing husband and biggest fan gave me his full support.

HMAG: For those who were not familiar with it, what was the original studio like? What were its main features? What kinds of programs and services did you provide?

CPS: I purchased a 6K sq ft building that needed lots of love. Ultimately, I used 4K sq ft to create 10 individual artist studios with their own sinks and drainage, two classrooms (one with bench space for 14 jewelry students), a wide-open gallery/event space, and common areas for the tenants. It was a beautiful, amazing space.

I brought in national and local instructors (including Val Link) for workshops; held numerous events, sales, and showings; and had tenants that came and went. It was my dream come true, but it was a lot—maybe too much! After six years, I was ready to downsize.

HMAG: What motivated the move to a new location?

CPS: My motivation for change was a succession of events, starting with my time constraints and the challenges of being a landlord. With all of the administrative overhead, I found I had little time to do my own creative work.

August 2017 brought Hurricane Harvey, flooding, and a rebuilding project that was slowed down due to lack of materials and workers. The final straw was the worldwide

COVID-19 shutdown of 2020. I had one remaining tenant and zero classes. I tried going online but found that metalsmithing is a difficult skill to teach on Zoom. My expenses were much higher than my income.

I decided to sell the existing building and look for a new space. I began the formal hunt in 2021.

HMAG: Was it hard to find an appropriate spot?

CPS: It was extremely difficult to find a new location. In fact, it took almost two years.

My list of wants had evolved quite a bit from the former space. Now I wanted an intimate space for where I could work and a classroom to where I could teach. I wanted to be able to host my ongoing monthly group of eight women students who have stuck with me since my garage apartment days. I owed it to them to find a proper place.

In April 2022, I found a 935 sq ft bungalow off Navigation Boulevard, in the Second Ward. I could envision it as the perfect studio. It even had an additional small building in the backyard, to serve as a rental studio for my loyal friend and previous tenant.

HMAG: What was the build-out process like?

CPS: I sold some equipment, moved in the rest, and started the daunting task of finding a place for everything to fit. Before long, I discovered that my floors were sagging! I hadn't anticipated the effect of the weight of all

my equipment on this tiny single-family home. I called in the professionals to reinforce the pier and beams.

This was followed by an electrical upgrade from the outdated 100-amp system. I couldn't have multiple tools plugged in at once or fuses would be blowing during classes. Finally, the very old roof needed replacing. However, I remained optimistic as I set out to make this tiny space work. It was magical how it all came together!

HMAG: When did you open?

CPS: I held my first class in May of 2022. It was very small, and we were all very careful. Optional masks, gloves, and tons of hand sanitizer were available. It was an amazing reunion with my longtime students who were eager to get back in the studio.

Although the smaller space accommodates fewer students, as an instructor it allows me to provide lots of hands-on attention to each participant. That's especially helpful when you're teaching new skills and machinery that students might find intimidating at first. There's nothing like watching new students grow and gain confidence.

HMAG: Tell readers about the new space. What do you like most about it?

CPS: My new studio space is small but absolutely perfect! Even when I'm out of Houston during the summer, the space gets used periodically by my tenant, by HMAG, and by one other group. In fact, HMAG is sponsoring a workshop here next month.

I love that it is filled with artists and laughter even when I'm not there. I love that with this small venue, I'm free to work my own magic in my own personal space. I've not had any outside instructors brought in yet. But all that will come. I'm taking my time and loving my new freedom!

I have found my happy place! It's been an amazing ride! With my experiences behind me, I look forward to the future. I will continue to grow Charisma Design Studio, at my ownpace.

HMAG: Good luck, Cathy! Keep us posted!

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Workshop Recap: Fundamentals of Benchtop Lapidary with Cathy Prieto-Smith

On May 6, HMAG hosted a one-day workshop on the fundamentals of benchtop lapidary with instructor Cathy Prieto-Smith. Thanks to Cathy's skillful instruction and well-organized lesson plan, students left the workshop with a new skill and one or two cabochons of their own creation.

Students arrived to find a complete kit set up at their benches. The morning began with the creation of a simple cabochon, with all of the students working in the same rough-cut stone in order to streamline the process. Cathy demonstrated the technique of securing the flex shaft horizontally to provide steady, stable grinding. Rather than attach the abrasive pad to the flex shaft, the stone itself was secured to it with wax, while the adhesive pad was submerged in a small water tray.

After lunch, students returned to the bench to tackle the second project, a stone-in-stone cabochon. After shaping the larger base cabochon, students learned how to drill into it in order to embed a smaller, bezel set stone. As in any good workshop, at the end of the day the students were surprised and impressed by how much they had accomplished.

"Cathy is a great teacher," one student said. "She's patient, practical, and knows how to get to the point. She provided us with lots of helpful tips and tricks as well as really helpful handouts. I'm glad I came."

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Upcoming Workshop: Forged and Filed Cuff Bracelets with Corey Ackelmire

Just in time for the holidays, HMAG is offering a workshop with **Corey Ackelmire** that will guide you in creating unique, classic cuff bracelets, ideal for gift giving or to keep for yourself.

In this one-day workshop, students will learn the basics of forging non-ferrous metals for the purpose of creating a brass or silver cuff bracelet using thick wire stock. Additionally, students will learn to use hand and needle files to carve the stock in order to create a variety of design effects.

Review: Out of Longing: New Work by Masumi Kataoka

Houston-based metalsmith, instructor, and musician **Masumi Kataoka** recently presented *Out of Longing*, a series of jewelry pieces inspired by mythical creatures,

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such as Chimera (animal hybrids), and religious symbolism, including Hindu and Buddhist statues featuring extra limbs or body parts. It's a darkly, seriously fanciful collection that rewards close study.

In terms of technique, the artist combines and electroforms insect bodies and parts, along with other natural items, and then enamels the resulting copper objects. This transmutation of all too mortal insects into timeless metal and glass accentuates the mystery underlying this body of work.

Upon entering the darkened, intimate gallery space at HCC, viewers first perceived a cycle of images of cloudy skies projected on a wall, accompanied by an atmospheric yet melodic music track. Mood appropriately set, viewers turned toward the cluster of untitled works, framed and mounted without captions on a wall. The work consisted of seven separate but thematically related brooches and pendants, the latter hung on simple cords.

Although based on identifiable electroformed insect carcasses, the pieces were not straightforward depictions but echoes (or dreams, as Kataoka would have it) of the original creatures. Other elements—perhaps a seed pod, a mysterious tuft of hair, or even body parts lent by other creatures—contributed to an entirely new representation.

Gazing at some of the pieces and letting the mind drift, one could glimpse fanciful images. For example, at first glance, one pendant (*pictured above*) resembled a stern, bearded king with a topknot protruding from his spiky crown, before resolving into a conglomeration of insect parts and human hair, combined into a graceful, balanced, and delicate form.

One particularly beautiful brooch (*pictured above*) consisted of two electroformed snail shells, artfully embraced by a pair of cicada wings. This pairing, Kataoka states, was initially inspired by the common symbolism of rebirth associated with both creatures, and in her artist's statement, she wonders aloud if snails sometimes dream of flying. The brooch was skillfully enameled in a glossy, rosy gray, with slightly opalescent tones that made the whole piece look as if it were still wet from the garden.

Each piece was pleasingly spare but clearly well thought out, and while on paper the subject matter might seem challenging, the actual pieces were surprisingly wearable in scale and subtly beautiful in their graceful contortions and tonal enameling. In this very successful exhibition, Kataoka demonstrated the value of looking more closely at ostensibly unpleasant subject matter, rather than turning away.

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Coming Soon Online: Halstead Jewelry Business Forum

Halstead Bead, a jewelry supply company, will be hosting its annual online Jewelry Business Forum from 1/15 - 1/18, 2024. This four-day event, in live webinar format, consists of 15 one-hour presentations. The sessions are a mix of maker demos and business development topics. All sessions will be recorded and available to view the week after the conference.

The speaker line up consists of experts in the jewelry field as well as in entrepreneurship. As Halstead states, "This digital conference is created to empower small jewelry business owners. The Forum is also an opportunity to connect with other jewelry business owners. Jewelers are often solopreneurs who are seeking peers for a sense of community. The online format allows busy small business owners to attend live sessions for part of the day and then return to their studio or office to work."
